Originally I had written this piece 1990 with a German text and made the adaption to the English language in 2007. The given accompanying chords can be executed on any chordal instrument (organ, harpsichord, guitar, harp, piano).

When the piece is performed with one voice per part, the Tenor must sing the base note (F) in the final chord. In case of a choral performance, the first verse (Tenor) should be sung by a soloist so that the contrasting plenitude of the choir sound additionally illustrates the text.
