

Musica ficta is inferred primarily from the manuscripts.

Spelling and grammar has been modernised, but the original text setting has not been changed.

This edition is a reconstruction of a version of this anthem present in the Peterhouse Caroline partbooks. This version rededicates the work to the reigning monarch at the time the partbooks were inscribed, Charles I. In addition, there are a number of alterations to the music as presented in other sources of this work. This includes a complete set of musica ficta, some ornamentation to existing passages, some alteration of the musical lines, and some additional polyphonic entries in the Tenor and Countertenor parts. Unfortunately, a complete set of parts for this work do not survive in the Caroline Sets. However, the organ part does survive. This is relatively complete, and contains a significant amount of information about the internal parts. By combining this organ part with the surviving vocal parts in the Caroline Sets, and vocal parts from other sources, both those contemporary with these manuscripts and those that predate them, the editor has been able to reconstruct the Caroline version of this anthem to what he believes is a reasonable degree of accuracy.

The editor has provided a realisation of the organ part. This realisation simply consists of a reduction of the vocal parts, and is represented by notes written in small type. The accompanist should feel free to use this realisation, or to improvise one of their own, as may have been the custom of those playing from the original part.

Performers should feel free to substitute the name 'Charles' for the name of future monarchs, as appropriate; this appears to have been the custom in the period in which this work was written.

This edition is thankfully dedicated to M.E.F.B..
