
## In That Morning

This is apparently the first arrangement of this tune, based on a camp meeting folk hymn from the last eighteenth or early nineteenth century. Other arrangements from the same source are by John G. McCurry (*Burges*, from *The Social Harp*, 1855) and Henry S. Reese (*Sweet Morning*, from *The Sacred Harp*, p. 421, 1860 to the present). *Sweet Morning* in *The Sacred Harp* is based on an English folk tune (Jackson 1953, No. 168).
