With few exceptions, the tune and text are provided here as printed in the revised and enlarged edition of *The Revivalist*, edited by Joseph Hillman and the Rev. L. Hartsough, published in Troy, New York in 1872. In that source, the editors printed the first system on two staves (Soprano / Alto, and Tenor / Bass), and the remainder of the hymn on three (Tenor / Bass on the same staff), and the first note of the Tenor is a major, and the first note of the bass a minor third lower than shown here. Finally, the editors did not show the syllables in the second through sixth strophes.
